Remember, the accumulation of dirt and dust is one of many reasons why mildew grows on your vinyl siding. Others, according to GoldEagle.com, are excessive moisture (not just rain; consistent wet spots from poor drainage, dripping faucets or air conditioner condensation), and lack of sunlight (hence, the north side of homes or areas in lengthy daily shade).

There are plenty of private services that clean siding. If you have a company or individual

you used in the past that you would recommend, pass it along to your neighbors. If you already have, thanks.

There are some caveats, especially when using power washers. Most are simple.

Read the washer instructions carefully before use. Aim the spray at eye level for most effective cleaning. Spraying upward with too much force can send water under the siding. Avoid using power washers around electrical outlets and other wall openings. If you know the manufacturer of your home's vinyl siding, get its recommendations for power washing. It's generally best to use low pressure.

Information is everywhere, online and from home improvement stores. If you've never cleaned siding before, spend some time learning the most effective techniques and materials.
